


One Small Step For Mankind!












With this speech, President Kennedy set into motion a long chain of events that would end with an American on the moon. The 'Moon Landing' ended the Space Race once and for all.





Three astronauts were chosen to lead the mission to the moon; Neil Armstrong, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins.











While the Apollo 11 crew were busy training for their moon mission, 400,000 other workers were busy at work making sure everything was prepared for the mission.










On 16th of July 1969, three astronauts boarded the enormous Saturn V rocket. The rocket was taller than the Statue of Liberty! These three astronauts were about to make history by being the first humans on the moon.

12 minutes later, the astronauts were orbiting Earth. In only 4 days, the Apollo 11 crew had reached the moon. Once they were in orbit, Armstrong and Aldrin climbed into the Eagle Lunar Lander. Collins stayed behind orbiting the moon.



'The Eagle' made it's slow landing on the moon itself. Even though the astronauts had practiced this landing many times on Earth, there really was no telling what would happen when they tried it on the moon for the first time.





At 3.17 pm, the NASA control room heard the words they were hoping for. Neil Armstrong's voice came over the radio and told them that 'The Eagle has landed'. The control room erupted into celebration! The next step was to get out of the Eagle.


